Dear Conference Attendee,

Greetings.

Before last year's elections, nervous pangs gnawed at us. We saw trends and we knew our choices; we balanced on a knife's edge: a feminist versus a racist and bigot. Many in LGBTQ communities were concerned that if the latter won, based on his campaign rhetoric, rights and healthcare would be in jeopardy. Our communities have been under relentless assault and siege since November 9; those hard fought for rights are under attack and the facilities provided by the Affordable Care Act, especially expanding mental health care, are under threat of elimination. For many LGBTQ peoples of color, who were beginning to accept the need for mental health care and, that it was, at last, affordable, were thrown into confusion and uncertainty - two toxic factors, which lead to further destabilization.

This year, our conference attempts to provide LGBTQ people of color communities with the tools, the resources and the confidence to navigate racism, bigotry, misogyny, homophobia, and transphobia as they search for and to obtain mental health care. We are honored by the overwhelming responses to our call for abstracts, and with gratitude to our team of independent reviewers for their recommendations; selection was competitive. Congratulations to those selected to present workshops, panel discussions and stand-alone presentations.

The conference schedule this year reflects the diversity in the many different aspects to mental health for LGBTQ peoples of color, and demonstrates the need to continue raising awareness, to systematically and methodically chip away at the pervasive stigma and discrimination surrounding mental health.

Significantly, with plenary speakers and breakouts, mental health professionals, academics and advocates will challenge traditions and break taboos in peoples of color communities, and as they do, focus on how and in what ways both clinicians and consumers can - against the backdrop of an increasingly hostile climate - obtain resources, gain knowledge and information, be educated, and identify networks for collaborations and service.

We extend gratitude to our sponsors and partners, who recognized the importance of bringing mental health in peoples of color communities out of the shadows of shame into the light, for healing.

As members of the Planning Team, we are part of a collaborative and community-oriented conference, representing many genders, sexual identities, and shades of brown - people of color; reflected in the conference logo.



Threshold of Trust: Why Home-Grown Mutual Aid Groups Matter and Implications for Policy & Practice Co-Presented by: Armstrong Tingwane, MPhil. and Durell Knights, GMHC

Fitzgerald Ballroom GMHC's model for low-threshold groups has been effective for clients. This presentation provides two examples: the Evolution Group, which provides mutual support to Transgender and Gender Non-Conforming (TGGNC) individuals; and the Barbershop Group, which provides intergenerational support for men who have sex with men. Presenters will describe each program through the voice of facilitators/clients and demonstrate its effectiveness through engaging case discussions and data from client feedback.

Do you see me? Viewing Trauma Treatment through a Cultural Lens

Co-Presented by: Adjoa Osei, Psy.D., and Jessica Harbaugh, Ph.D.

Despite the growing numbers of hate crimes violence against lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, and queer (LGBTQ) people of color (POC) each year (National Coalition of Anti-Violence Programs, 2016), the attack on these intersecting identities is not well understood in professional mental health settings or in academic literature. This presentation will explore Judith Herman's (1997) three-stage model for trauma treatment and its relevance and potential limitations for working with clients who are LGBTQ POC.

Positive Youth Development (PYD) with LGBTQ Youth of Color with Mental Health Issues: An Anti-Oppressive Approach to Practice Co-Presented by: De'Shay Thomas, MSW; Lynn C. Holley, PhD, ACSW; Nora Gustavsson, PhD **Rockwell Room** This presentation will provide an overview of an anti-oppressive approach to PYD that speaks to the unique experiences of LGBTQ youth of color with mental health issues. Grounded in intersectionality and anti-oppressive practice, presenters will illustrate how critical consciousness can transform all aspects of the Five Cs and that a sixth C – change-making – is needed. Two case vignettes with interactive questions will be used to facilitate dialogue around positive development for LGBTQ youth of color with mental health issues.

Crisis Centers: Building Intersectional LGBTQ Cultural Competence to Recognize Race in Suicidal Crises Presented by: Adam D. Šwanson, MPP

Gillespie Room Suicide is the second leading cause of death in the U.S. for individuals aged 10 to 34, and research highlights increasing rates of suicidal crises among Black adolescents. Yet, many crisis providers lack training on how intersectional minority identities can influence suicide prevention service engagement. A crisis center provider training curriculum is being developed to address the unique needs to LGBTQ youth of color. This session will provide an overview of the proposed curriculum framework, design, and future opportunities to improve crisis services for LGBTQ individuals of color.

Here We Are Safe (Subtitle: The Need for Therapeutic/Social Supports in the Masculine Trans/GNC Community) Presented by: Jaro Montana, LMSW

Group therapy has long been proven as beneficial to the LGBTQ community, but a lack of Transgender/Gender-non-conforming resources has left a large gap in mental healthcare. As providers we can offer these much needed services, but we must learn how to create a safe space for social supports in and out of a therapeutic setting. This workshop will allow an interactive opportunity to experience a group from the client's point of view.

Restoration: Implementing a Trauma Informed Faith-based Mental Health Model Co-Presented by: Millicent Freeman, Ph.D. and Janet Lerner, PhD, LCSW

Co-Speaker - Johanne Morne, MS, NYS AIDS Institute "Moving the Dial Forward Through Innovative and Collaborative Approaches"



Johanne Morne is Director of the New York State Health Department's AIDS Institute, since 2008. The AIDS Institute broadened its mission by integrating hepatitis and STD services, surveillance, opioid overdose prevention, and non-HIV LGBT services into its structure. The Institute formulates HIV, hepatitis, and STD policy; initiates, develops, and evaluates programs for the delivery of HIV-related services, hepatitis, STD prevention, health care and supportive services; establishes clinical standards and oversees quality management; educates health care providers and the public; and guides regional and statewide planning. In its more than 30-year history, the AIDS Institute provided leadership in New York State, at the national level, and internationally. Most recently, Johanne has worked closely with community stakeholders to implement the Governor's plan to end AIDS as an epidemic in New York State by the end of 2020. The AIDS Institute is a \$500 million public health

program with more than 400 staff.

Co-Speaker - Kraig Pannell, NYS AIDS Institute "Moving the Dial Forward Through Innovative and Collaborative Approaches"



Kraig Pannell, originally from Rochester, NY, graduated from Bucknell University with a degree in Political Science. He is pursuing a graduate degree in Public Health at the State University of New York, Albany. Kraig designed and implemented the first HIV prevention and education program targeting gay men/MSM in Northeastern Pennsylvania, led HIV prevention demonstration projects across the state of Pennsylvania to inform and assist in the development of an HIV prevention plan, worked with suicidal and homicidal children and adolescents to prevent hospitalization, and coordinated a therapeutic after school program for dually diagnosed young people. Returning to New York, he was appointed Program Director with Men of Color Health Awareness (MOCHA) project in Rochester. At MOCHA, he was instrumental in securing the agency's two federal contracts, from HRSA and OMH, for HIV prevention demonstration projects; tripled their annual budget and increased staff both in the Rochester and Buffalo offices. He is a Fellow of The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention/Association of Schools of Public Health Institute for HIV Prevention Leadership and successfully completed a multi-year training program and mentorship with the Association of Fundraising Professionals. Kraig is the Assistant Director with the LGBT Health Services Unit of the New York State Department of Health AIDS Institute, where he develops plans for LGBT Health, including program policies and standards, data management, and initiatives to address emerging needs within the LGBT communities.

Speaker - Earl Fowlkes, Jr., Center For Black Equity "Dealing with the Stigma of Mental Health: A Personal Journey"



Earl Fowlkes serves as the President and CEO of the Center For Black Equity, Inc. (formerly the International Federation of Black Pride -IFBP). He founded the IFBP in 1999 as a coalition of organizers from the United States, Canada, the United Kingdom and South Africa to promote a multinational network of Black LGBT Pride and community-based organizations. Prior to working at the Center For Black Equity, he served for 15 years as the executive director of the DC Comprehensive AIDS Resources and Education Consortium (DC CARE Consortium) and Damien Ministries, two organizations that provided services to persons living with HIV/AIDS in Washington, DC.; he was elected to the Board of Directors of Damien Ministries in 2017. He was former chair of the Washington, DC Mayor's GLBT Advisory Committee and is the Chair of the Washington, DC Commission on Human Rights. His political activism was focused on voter registration and getting out the vote campaigns in communities of color and to LGBT Democratic constituents. In 2009, he was appointed by then Virginia Governor, Tim Kaine, as an At-Large member of the Democratic National Committee (DNC). In August 2013, he was reappointed, and later elected Chair of the DNC LGBT Caucus; in the same year, he was one of the Grand Marshalls of the Heritage of Pride (NYC Gay Pride) Parade. In September 2014, he was given the Wanda Alston Democratic Service Award by the Gertrude Stein Democratic Club in Washington, DC, and later elected the Club's President. Earl is considered an expert on LGBT and HIV/AIDS issues, has written many articles and op-eds, and appeared on the Roland Martin and Michael Baisden shows.

Speaker - Kenyon Farrow, Treatment Action Group "Home: Creating and Sustaining Community for Black Gay Men in the 21st Century"



Kenyon Farrow is the US and Global Health Policy Director for Treatment Action Group, an independent AIDS research work on criminalization, mass imprisonment, homelessness and HIV issues. In addition to his political work, Kenyon is a prolific essayist and author. He is the co-editor of the book "Letters from Young Activists: Today's Rebels Speak Out". His

and policy think tank fighting for better treatment, a vaccine, and a cure for AIDS, TB and Hepatitis C. He recently published a qualitative research project exploring the role of community mobilization in the US HIV response in nine US cities. He was the executive director of Queers for Economic Justice, and has a long track record of community organizing work appears in anthologies, including "Spirited: Affirming the Soul of Black Lesbian and Gay Identity, Against Equality: Queer Critiques of Same-Sex Marriage", "For Colored Boys Who Have Considered Suicide When The Rainbow Is Still Not Enough", "We Have Not Been Moved: Resisting Racism and Militarism in 21st Century America", and "Black Gay Genius: Answering Joseph Beam's Call". He has published in the Atlantic, the Huffington Post, TheGrio, Colorlines, RH Reality Check, the American Prospect, and AlterNet. Kenyon was named one of Out magazine's "Out 100 for 2008", the Advocate magazine's "40 Under 40" LGBT Leaders in the United States for 2010, one of Black Entertainment Television's "Modern Black History Heroes" for 2011. He received the "Community Activist" award at Chicago Black Pride's Esteem Awards in 2013, and the Woodhull Institute's 2016 "Sexual Freedom Award".



Janae Williams realized while as a high school teacher that it was a vocation which opened the door for her activism and advocacy work. She understood the importance of places and the potential for learning, and living to be "liberatory" for many in sexually marginalized communities. She worked with young femmes and women, Black and LGBTQI+ peoples, and many living at the intersection of other identities, to encourage these communities to envision their inclusion as they are and with their lived experiences. Janae was a Thurgood Marshall College Fund Teacher Quality and Retention Program Fellow, where she founded "All of the Above Ed", a space for Black LGBTQI+ educators to learn, collaborate, and grow together.

Facilitator – "Community SpeakOut" Carmen Vazquez, NYS AIDS Institute



Carmen Vazquez was born in Puerto Rico and grew up in Harlem, New York. She lists among her many accomplishments: Founding Director of the Women's Building in San Francisco; helped found the Lavender Youth Recreation and Information Center in San Francisco; and the LGBT Health and Human Services Network, a coalition of over 55 organizations and groups in New York advocating for LGBT Health and Human Services, obtaining more than \$70 million dollars in state funding for its members. She is a founder and principal author of Causes in Common (a national coalition of Reproductive Justice and LGBT Liberation activists) and of the Pride in Action programs at Empire State Pride Agenda. Carmen is the recipient of an honorary law degree from CUNY School of Law for her public interest work and her papers are part of the permanent collection at the Sophia Smith Archives at Smith College. Her essays have been published in several anthol-

ogies and she has spoken at many conferences and campus events on intersectional issues surrounding social justice and sexual freedom. She is the Director of the LGBT Health Services Unit with the AIDS Institute of the NYS Department of Health.
